- is a potential candidate for advanced placement history courses in freshman and sophomore years
- has strong organizational and time management skills?
- has strong reading and writing skills and is willing to improve them?
- contributes insightful and salient points to class discussions and writing assignments?
- is prepared to learn and use effective strategies for comprehending textbook and historical documents?
- is prepared to learn effective strategies to be successful on challenging common assessments and quarterly exams?
- is an *independent* learner who is anxious to improve your skills?



The chart below provides an approximation of the time and assignments for the Pre AP courses offered in the Social Studies Department and may vary from student to student. Different teachers for the same course may have slightly different procedures, but the time commitment is about the same.
